COVID-19 Response:

The outbreak of COVID-19 has exemplified the continued and growing need for food justice and social cohesion in our community. At API, we tailored our programs to continue addressing these issues. While we were unable to gather around the table and share a meal together this year, there was still plenty of food to go around. Here are some of the things API was able to accomplish in 2020:

- 2 days a week of **to-go meals** and grocery distribution offered to the community.
- An estimated 5,000 prepared to-go meals distributed this year.
- Over 200 community members volunteered with Asheville Poverty Initiative in 2020
- Collectively, volunteers contributed over 9,000 hours to the Cafe program
- Provided space for community partner outreach and education including Buncombe County Health and Human Services and Sunrise Peer Support.



COVID RESPONSE TARTNERSHIP WITH ASHEVILLE CITY AND HOMEWARD BOUND:

Starting in March 2020, API began to **coordinate 700 meals a week** for houseless folks staying at Harrah's
Cherokee Center by leveraging our strong relationships
with local faith communities, restaurant owners, nonprofits, and businesses. In May 2020, the city approved a
contract between Homeward Bound and Red Roof Inn
to continue providing emergency housing into 2021.
Throughout the year, API has continued to coordinate **3 meals a week, 7 days a week, feeding 65+ houseless folks in emergency pandemic housing** at the Red
Roof Inn.

REALITIES OF POVERTY EDUCATION PROGRAM

With a sharp reduction in school community engagement due to the pandemic, our Realities of Poverty programming temporarily paused and transitioned to virtual platforms. In 2020, 3 poverty Educators were paid a total of \$705 for their work with 4 college and community groups including a semester-long collaboration with the Warren Wilson College Social Work department that has continued to flourish in 2021.
